- * "Two Guys Walk Into a Bar" --- Lucy v. Zehmer

- Legal research is not just Westlaw or Lexis.
 - ♦ Live time "look that up" w/real-time factchecking.
 - * Require two corroborating sources.

- (¶ 9) Appellant timely perfected an appeal to this court, and presents two assignments of error for our review, as follows:



Encourage Student Inquiry and Debate: Critical

thinking is essential; create a space where students feel comfortable questioning legal principles.

Scenario: Work-from-Home Requests

The Story:

Ramesh works at a company that requires employees to work in the office every day. He asks if he can work from home two days a week because he gets more done in a quiet environment. His boss says no, because that's the company rule.

Scenario: The Apartment Parking Rule

The Story:

Mark lives in an apartment complex with a rule that says only one car per tenant is allowed in the parking lot. Mark just bought a second car for work, but the landlord says he can't park it in the lot. Mark argues that there are plenty of open spaces and that the rule is outdated.

Judicial Restraint vs. Judicial Activism

Restraint

Judges should:

- √look to the original Intent of the Constitution
- ✓ Look at the intent of the legislators that wrote the law
- ✓ Respectful of precedents
- ✓Argue that changes to the Constitution can only be made thru the Amendment process

Activism

Judges should:

- √Look <u>beyond</u> the original intent of the Framers
- √"Living Constitution" (changes over time)
- ✓ <u>Active</u> action is necessary and appropriate at times
- √Can be involved in interpreting and enlarging laws

Provide Frequent Feedback: Timely and constructive feedback fosters student improvement and confidence.





Example:

Original post: One person that I respect very much is my mother. She is no longer living but I respect the way she moved through the world. She was always so patient, forgiving, and kind to everyone she met. She didn't judge people and always sought to make them feel heard and understood. In my life, I have come to understand that there are two sides to every story-good and bad. Even if I feel like I was wronged in some way by another person, I had a part to play in that. I strive to acknowledge my role in things when the outcome isn't what I had hoped for.

Reply post to a classmate's post: I understand that your mother was influential in your life and someone you respected very much even though she's no longer alive. The traits that you respect the most about her are her patience, non-judgmental views, ability to forgive, and kindness toward everyone she meets. You tend to give people the benefit of the doubt, understanding that there are various sides to every situation. You also seek to understand your role in situations, even if it results in an unfavorable outcome.

Question prompts to use:

- 1) Who is one person you really respect, living or dead? Why do you respect them?
- 2) What are some ways you show respect for yourself?
- 3) Describe a time you "did the right thing," even though it was hard to do.
- 4) What is something you've learned in your life that has been important to you? Why was it important?
- 5) What is something you've done that you're proud of? Why?
- 6) What are some things you want to do in your life? Why?
